The Anglican Parish of Cressy has been involved with chaplaincy at the local district high school and this has included SU Tas when it became the employing agency for our chaplaincy. John de Bruyn

We are excited to have John de Bruyn speak at the SU Tas Fundraising Dinners this year. John is a prominent Tasmanian, pastor and business personality and will be sharing his personal testimony with us.

John was born in Lopik, a town in the 'Green Heart' of the Netherlands. He came to Australia as a 14-year-old with his family, settling in the township of Penguin, Tasmania. He has worked full-time in the family transport business for the past 36 years and for the last 23 years as the General Manager and owner of De Bruyn's Transport (formerly West Coast Transport Pty Ltd).

In 1995, John, along with his brother and cousin, purchased the business from his father and uncle. In those days the company had just 40 staff, 20 trucks and one transport terminal. John says, "I love business and transport, and was already keenly interested and involved from a very young age. I have mechanical qualifications, but during my career I have covered every aspect of the business: driving trucks, operating earth-moving machinery, administration, business development and more".

From those humble beginnings the business has now grown to over 230 staff, 130 trucks and four transport terminals. In addition, they now provide marine logistics for the aquaculture industry and operate a fleet of three vessels.

As a business man, John certainly has an interesting story to tell, but it is his faith which is his true passion, as he seeks to live his life 'for a greater purpose' (the theme of this year's dinners). John is involved as a board member of Empart, which exists to bring holistic and social transformation to individuals and communities in Asia. Along with his wife Louisa, John founded the Rock Community Church over 11 years ago, a prominent and growing church in Penguin which seeks to reach out to all, including the disengaged.

"The Rock Community Church is about reaching out with a message of love, kindness and purpose," says John. "As a family man with now four adult children and a grandson, I wanted a church which impacts our community, offering relevant life teaching, family friendly events and having fun walking life's journey together. Relevant and family-focused ministry is also what drives SU Tas and so I'm looking forward to sharing with you at the upcoming dinners."

A highlight was seeing how enthusiastic our campers were to read the Bible, with several asking to take their first Bible home.
