OVERCOMING THE ELEMENTS

Your support helps teens hear the gospel

July 2019 marked the re-launch of Scripture Union Tasmania's Element Camp at Liffey Falls Campsite, and what a great camp it was! We're excited to let you know that your support helped a group of teenagers have meaningful discussions about God as they learnt about working through life's difficulties.

16 campers from grades 7–10 and nine awesome leaders had the privilege of taking on the Elements, and eating some pretty awesome food, in some of the best wilderness available in God's amazing creation.

Camp was based on surviving the Elements. Devotions were themed around Soul Surfer and Bethany Hamilton's amazing story of survival and taking on life's challenges after losing an arm in a shark attack.

The theme generated some great conversations and pointed the campers to situations in the Bible where faith in God gave people the strength to overcome the challenges they faced. Campers were reminded that regardless of the situation, they were not alone. We dicovered that all we need is a change of perspective.

Campers took on a couple of bush walks. One was to Liffey Falls, where the water was flowing very powerfully due to recent rainfall, which was amazing to witness. The other bush walk seemed to have no end ... we just kept walking, walking, and walking!

Some of the many activities included making screen printed t-shirts and rustic picture frames. We built stretchers and shelters (using only branches and leaves) and had a first aid challenge, where campers carried an injured party on their stretcher to the shelter ready for evacuation. These activities required some team building and a lot of patience and they highlighted the importance of having others around us to strengthen our resolve.

Thank you for making camps like Element possible for young people to experience God's love in community.



Even after becoming a Commonwealth Games medalist, Nicola McDermott is still aiming for the heights as she seeks to achieve her childhood dreams.

Hailing from the Central Coast of NSW, Nicola describes how it all started. "When I first started sports such as swimming, tennis or dancing – I was just terrible. But then at my first school carnival, to my surprise, I started winning all of the events. I realised I had a gift and my parents put me into Little Athletics, which I immediately

Why Chaplaincy?

People sometimes ask us why SU Tas are involved in school chaplaincy. As a Christian organisation, we see chaplaincy as a vital arm of our work in showing love and care to young people and making a positive difference to our school communities. But sometimes the best answer comes from the feedback we get from school communities themselves. Take a look at just some of the many responses from school principals about the chaplaincy service:

This ambitious dream is getting closer to being realised every day. Having jumped 1.76m in 2011, Nicola has been beating her personal best every year. In 2018, Nicola won bronze at the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast with 1.91m. Nicola believes the medal win was a turning point in her career as she proved she could perform despite immense pressure.

Excitingly, Nicola recently finished third at the Ostrava Golden Spike Meet with a Tokyo Olympic Qualifying height of 1.96m. This now brings her within striking distance of a medal, with the gold medal won at the 2016 Rio Olympics with a jump of 1.97m. McDermott is now equal third on the Australian all-time rankings list and in the top 10 in the 2019 World Rankings.

Nicola's faith has been instrumental in helping her overcome challenges and aim for greater heights. In describing the start of her Christian journey, she says she was bullied as a child and singled out for her height. But when she enrolled in a Christian school in Year 6, she experienced the overwhelming, non-judging love of Jesus from


Christian students and teachers. Nicola gave her life to Jesus back then and has since grown in her faith through youth groups and church. She joined the Evangelical Union at Sydney University, where she was able to lead Bible studies and openly share her journey to large groups.

In 2017 Nicola began a Christian athlete ministry called Everlasting Crowns that sees athletes connect to local sports chaplains for Christian support and encouragement. Today she is a wonderful ambassador for her sport and a role model for young people. This year's theme for the SU Tas dinner is 'A Brighter Tomorrow' and Nicola is excited to inspire us with a vision for communities to encourage our young people to be the best they can be. "I love the platform this sport gives me to be a role model for the next generation," Nicola says.

Director's Desk

I recently reflected on a journal that I made some months ago. In that entry I had noticed a few leaves on the trees exchanging their vibrant summer green for their autumn glory. As I thought about this, I realised that it was a good picture of how we humans can

respond to the changing seasons of life.

In our modern world with things moving so quickly change is inevitable. The way we respond to change, however, is as unique as each of us.

Some people are ahead of the game. They can see change is coming, they get ready straight away, and look ahead. For others, they wait a little longer, wait until they are sure the change is coming. But they see others ready for change and join them, not wanting to be left behind. Then there are those who just want things to stay the way they are. They are like those leaves that just stubbornly hang on through winter, even well and truly past their prime, brown and dried up. We can be just as stubborn, holding on to the past when that season has well and truly finished.

Jesus talked a bit about recognising seasons in Luke 21 by reminding us not to be afraid (v. 9), but to be alert, ready for what is next (v. 34–36). Although we can get very comfortable in the season we are in, like the leaf on the branch, at some stage we need to change.

As Scripture Union Tasmania enters a period of change we invite you to journey with us on an exciting new adventure.

SU ACROSS AUSTRALIA

Partnering Together

You may or may not be aware that Scripture Union in each state of Australia is a fully



autonomous organisation. Since November 2015 there has been ongoing conversation about how greater collaboration between state movements could further grow ministry across the country. Throughout these conversations it has become apparent that there is a shared heart and vision of SU across Australia.

In 2019, discussions have been had regarding a process by which SU can join together across Australia as a national movement, which each state movement can choose to join. The SU Tasmania Council is strongly supportive of this journey. We see that coming together in formal partnership will enable us to fulfil God's purposes for SU across this country, in ways that we just can't do as separate state movements.

Like each state movement, SU Tas has a distinctive ministry that is unique compared to other states. There's an understandable concern that in a national movement, we could lose some of our distinctiveness and missional approaches. However, the focus of the national project is that a strong priority is placed on supporting localised grassroots mission and regional leadership. As we collaborate together, our hope is that missional culture and ministry will grow in Tasmania, rather than decrease.

In these changing times, a vibrant vision is now emerging of what SU could look like nationally. Our Chair of SU Tas, Elysia Cunningham, says, "SU Tas is uniquely placed with a wealth of knowledge and experience amongst our staff, a fantastic base of volunteers and supporters, and a long history of connecting with the community. We are looking forward to more mission opportunities to further spread the gospel. We encourage you to be prayerful as we rely fully on God's provision and leading."
