What a blessing and privilege it is to be part of the SU fellowship in Tasmania!

As part of a national SU movement, we share the vision "that every child, young person and family in Australia has opportunities of transforming experiences with Jesus and a life-long journey of discipleship and service."

In Tasmania, this has recently looked like this: The SU summer started with the bushwalking adventure, 'Taking on Goliath', which was followed up with Stanley Beach Mission, East Devonport Holiday Happening, and the St Helens Beach Mission before COVID concerns meant our family camps in the north and south were postponed. We're excited that we now have 45 campers and 12 leaders looking forward to these camps in the autumn and winter months.

Just before school went back, we celebrated the start of a new SU ministry, the Lego Club in George Town, enjoyed an Element Camp reunion at the Gorge in Launceston, and the SU Northern Suburbs Kids Games started up again in Invermay. We also held our first state-wide Chaplaincy PL Day which was a wonderful opportunity to connect, share and equip our chaplains as they prepared for another year at school.

Halfway through Term 1 and with the theme, "Let's all walk together!", a group of determined teenagers and young adults set

out to walk up to the Scout Hut at Cradle Mountain for the Bush N' Biscuits Camp and got to experience God's love for them.

Finally, we rounded off an exciting summer of mission through launching the national vision of SU in Tasmania at the three events: a breakfast celebration in Hobart, a dessert night in Ulverstone, and a commissioning service in Launceston. We were inspired to hear of future plans for SU and had the privilege of hearing from Peter James, CEO of SU Australia.

This edition of *SU News* will be our final "SU Tasmania" branded newsletter and our next edition will see a nationally developed 'SU Australia' newsletter with a Tasmanian focus. While this will have a new look, our mission hasn't changed. We still continue to meet children, young people, and their families where they are at, champion Bible engagement and prayer, partner with churches and communities, equip and release volunteer leaders, and explore innovative ways for connection and mission.

Thank you for your invaluable partnership and helping us to multiply our ministries in Tasmania through your prayers, ideas, time, passion, dedication, and generosity! Vision Roadshow

The SU Australia Vision Launch tour in Tasmania inspired supporters to continue outworking SU's mission as they heard from Peter James, Group CEO of SU Australia, and Stephanie Sebastian, our newly appointed SU Regional Manager for Tasmania.

Stephanie and Peter started their island tour on Saturday 19 March with a breakfast at Hope Christian Church in North Hobart. The event was coordinated by Ruth Pinkerton, former SU Tas State Director, and was emceed by Richard Humphrey, son of the late Dennis Humphrey, who was the original chair of SU Tas and who, with his wife Delyth, was a significant contributor to SU in the state. Ruth says, "There was a real sense of the good things of the past going on to flourish in the future (and now) stronger together in the new national structure."

After a pit-stop lunch at long-term SU supporters David and Jennifer Meadows' home in Launceston, it was then on to a dessert evening on the Saturday night at the Anglican Church in Ulverstone. The gathering was coordinated by former SU Tas staff and council member, Sally Tibbits, and emceed by Barb Totterdell from the Anglican Church. 30 locals gathered together to hear from Peter and Stephanie and were encouraged by locals involved in NW ministries in the past and today.

The culmination of the weekend was the commissioning service of Stephanie as Regional Manager at Punchbowl Christian Church in Launceston on the Sunday. Approximately 130 people attended and it was wonderful to see so many familiar faces - current and past participants of SU ministries - and members of the SU family. Peter James inspired us to see ourselves as part of the bigger picture, while continuing to engage in the work of God through SU in our local area. Stephanie was interviewed by former council member Tania Strong, and shared highlights of the past 10 years, including encouraging stories of God at work through SU. The commissioning concluded with David Meadows praying a powerful prayer for God's wisdom, guidance and anointing.

"At the end of 2021 and after 12 years with Scripture Union Tasmania, I made the difficult decision to move on to a new chapter of work. I'll be now working in my birth/school town of Devonport, supporting families through the challenging time of life that comes with funerals.

I certainly left SU with many fond memories and experiences. Being a full-time school chaplain for six years was an incredible and unexpected career change in 2010. I have lifelong friends from Penguin District School and relationships with community groups and churches that I wouldn't have had otherwise.

Transitioning then into the Regional Coordinator /Field Development Manager role was also rewarding. It was a great joy for me to go back into schools and see what chaplains are doing in their communities. I especially enjoyed meeting up with church communities from across the state (but especially in the NW), working with pastors and church members, and helping quite a few navigate child safety requirements.

I will avoid naming people, but some of the highlights include: the many camps and school excursions, including trips to the Gold Coast, Vietnam, Cambodia; learning to surf (sort of!); re-engaging with bush walking; attending computer camps; and SU conferences inter-state.

Lastly, SU Tas has been a real blessing to my family (and lately the wider SU Australia family) and I cannot speak more favourably about the entire team, their passion, faith and work. I wish you all well and pray daily that God will continue to bless this state, country and globe through the work of staff, volunteers and supporters of Scripture Union."
